Armed Forces Covenant

The Staffordshire Provincial Lodge Masonic Armed Forces Covenant is to be signed on Thursday 23rd September at 11am. It is happening at our National Masonic Memorial Garden in the shadow of the Armed Forces Memorial and will be the first of the many Provincial Grand Lodges to sign.

Freemasonry has in fact been supporting our Armed Forces Community for more 300 years mainly through military lodges. Many of our older lodges in Staffordshire have their origins





based upon local militias of the 18th century. Many of our rituals and the festive board traditions today could be found in the officer and sergeant messes of these early military lodges.

When I came to the light, admittedly totally confused, I immediately recognised at the festive board that a number of my mother lodge's (St. Johns of Lichfield No.1039) traditions were firmly based on its military past. As a former soldier I recognised them, they were not unfamiliar to me as they reminded me of my regiment's mess. I felt I had found a home amongst my new brothers.

Our own Staffordshire Masonic Armed Forces Covenant has been over seven months in the making and we are signing up to the following pledges:

The Provincial Grand Lodge of Staffordshire recognises the value Serving Personnel, Reservists, Veterans and Military Families bring to our business. We will seek to uphold the principles of the Armed Forces Covenant, by:

- Promoting the Armed Forces: promoting the fact that we are an Armed Forces-friendly organisation, to our brethren and wider public.
- Veterans: supporting veterans, recognising military skills and qualifications in our membership recruitment and selection process.
- Reserves: supporting our brethren who are members of the Reserve Forces.
- Cadet Organisations: supporting our brethren who are volunteer leaders in military cadet organisations, supporting and encouraging our members join local military cadet units.
- National Events: supporting Armed Forces Day, Reserves Day, the Poppy Appeal Day and Remembrance activities.
- Armed Forces Charities: supporting Armed Forces charities with fundraising and supporting brethren who volunteer to assist.

Notwithstanding all of the issues that have faced us all over the last 18 months, the group of Founders have kept in contact and have been working hard in the background to ensure: arrangements for specialist Lodge Furniture; designs for the banner and jewels etc. have been produced; that the chosen ritual has been adopted; and that one or two tweaks to the 'non-ritual' aspects have been agreed.

The one thing that could not be taken forward was the completion of the actual application form, as we had to wait for:

- A minuted note that an existing Lodge had agreed to be the sponsoring (Mother) Lodge - Andresey Lodge kindly agreed to do that for us.
- The application form had to be signed by every Founder, and of course restrictions around travelling and meeting have only recently been lifted.

On 14th August the majority of Founders were able to meet at their chosen meeting place, Chase Golf Club, Penkridge. At this meeting, rehearsals for opening and closing processions took place. You may be interested to know that the Founders come from all parts of England, and this brings with it a number of different styles which are seen in the various Provinces, so this was an interesting exercise, although very rewarding. The most important thing however, was to get the signatures of the attendees onto the

application form.

At the end of the event. of the 31 Founders, a total of eight signatures were still needed. W Bro Mike Santopietro, Assistant Provincial Grand Master therefore arranged to meet with those Brethren. to obtain those final 'marks'. W Bro Mike has been happy to report that following his travels to Warrington, Stoke, Leek, Telford, Uttoxeter, and Halesowen, where he met Brethren from as far afield as Blackpool and Bath, the form has now been fully completed and has been passed on to the Province to be

countersigned and sent on to UGLE, along with the designs for the banner and jewels which need to be approved too.

We await approval, and a date for the consecration - fingers crossed!

The Charity Stewards Corner

Freemasonry has restarted, but not as we know it! to coin a phrase from our proposed new lodge. But really, Freemasonry has never stopped despite all the Covid-19 restrictions and lockdowns. The masonic halls may have been closed for many months and now only just opening for meetings, but much work has been going on both nationally and within the province in providing care and relief to both masons, their families and the public at large.

The MCF under its new Chairman Sir Paul Williams has been spending an additional £3.2 million in giving 607 Covid-19 related grants as well as £46 million to charitable causes. In the Province grants have been made in continuing to support local foodbanks, hospices and the homeless, indeed only recently a grant from the MCF for £15,000 was made to Sandwell Parents Support Group for Disabled Children. The Provincial Grand Master and I had the privilege of visiting the group when they had their first 'Outing' since the start of this pandemic. The children had been taken to Blackwell Adventure Park for the day and in glorious sunshine had the opportunity to experience some hair-raising rides, the joy on their beaming faces that day made all our fundraising so worthwhile. Also, Lodges have been raising monies for their specific Charites via zoom guizzes, virtual raffles and auctions and sponsoring various events, well done to you all.

The Staffordshire County Show which is normally held in the Spring was eventually held in late August, we were blessed with good weather and how the crowds came, with nearly 26,000 visitors. Thanks to the tremendous efforts of W. Bro David Watt, our new Provincial display trailer was having its first outing and along with the new Air Ambulance display pod and Phil Barley promoting the 'Blood Bikes' made

our stand a real crowd puller. I'm not sure all the 26,000 came to our stand but I am sure that this certainly raised our public image.

A recent survey conducted on behalf of UGLE has indicated



that Freemasonry is at long last being seen as a power for good in the eyes of the general public. You will see in the article by W. Bro Mike Vozza that we as Freemasons have donated over 3 million Teddies to young children when in times of distress, the money for which comes from the you.

I am sure that you haven't forgotten that the Staffordshire 2024 Festival fundraising is still active and needs your support. It has been decided that the Festival will be relaunched in February with a new brochure, with ideas and incentives for fund raising events as we make a determined effort to reach our target of £2 million. Yes. I know we have been somewhat side-tracked by this wretched virus in our fundraising, but the target is possible if we all give it our best effort. The MCF relies on Festivals for its income, if we don't collect, they cannot give to all the often-desperate charities and causes, which unfortunately will be with us for many years to come.

So as we restart, I ask brethren to consider their own personal situation regarding donating to the Festival. I know that many of you are facing difficult home situations regarding both health, with Long Covid and financial issues, with Furlough ending, but I do hope that if this is the case you have sought advice / help from the Provincial Almoner Tony Coates and his team, even if it's only to talk through your problems with them. However, there are I know many of you who can donate a little more, think of all those masonic meals and lodge raffles you have saved on. It is easy

to boost your RPP (regular payments) or send a single donation by using the Staffs 2024 QR code or going onto the Provincial Web site and using one of the many donating avenues. Please give it a thought.

Staffordshire Freemasons through the Masonic Charitable Foundation have donated £15,000 to the Sandwell Parents for Disabled Children charity based in West Bromwich. The charity was founded in 2003 and supports physically disabled children as well as children with special needs and also their parents and siblings. They cater for children up to 8 years old and provide a wide variety of activities.

On Tuesday 9th August John Lockley the Head of Staffordshire Freemasons

having hired the
Blackwell Adventure
Park in Worcestershire
for a fun day out.

Together with Operations Manager Linda Lloyd and Activities Coordinator Sam Ward they watched as the children took part in many exciting activities, including the 3G swing which allows children with parents to swing through the air at high speed, helping to overcome fear of heights and speed. Other attractions included a Tree Top walk where children are securely

and safely hoisted into the tops of trees and along cat walks.

John Lockley said 'It is a pleasure to see the children enjoying themselves so much, the money is going to such a worthwhile cause. This charity gives wonderful support to the children and gives them experiences they would not otherwise enjoy'. Linda and Sam thanked John for the generous donation.



Teddies for Loving Care

The Teddies for Loving Care initiative

provides unique cuddly bears to Accident & Emergency departments for medical staff to give at their discretion to young children. The bears are used to calm children down, reward them for being brave or to demonstrate procedures. Often the bears distract children so nurses and doctors can get their jobs done quickly and efficiently. The TLC teddy has become an invaluable tool for medical professionals

and a real comfort for children.

The work of TLC is funded through the generous donations of Freemasons, their families and supporters of the programme. Many Freemasons also volunteer hundreds of hours each year to manage the scheme, deliver bears to hospitals, campaign

to raise funds and increase awareness through events and talks. Each Province funds its own teddies to give to their local hospitals and here in Staffordshire the bears are completely funded by the SMCA.

Only recently the 3 millionth Teddy was presented to Jackie James, Play Specialist at Peterborough City Hospital by Dr David Staples, Hospital Consultant Physician and CEO of UGLE. On receiving the Teddy,





she commented "The Teddies for loving Care are very special to us in the A & E department and have wonderful, positive impact on children who are receiving care. When a child first arrives at hospital not

only are they feeling unwell, but they may also be feeling scared and anxious. The little TLC Teddies provide some comfort and really help make them feel at ease".

added: "We are delighted to be able to present the three millionth bear from 'Teddies for Loving Care' initiative to the hard-working staff at Peterborough City Hospital. As a doctor, who also works at this hospital, I know how important these bears can be; both for the children who receive them and the staff who give them.


From the Provincial Director of Ceremonies
